

THE BLUE DOOR IS OPEN Last

week the Blue Door announced a new, truncated schedule effective midin November. The schedule will continue to wind down through the end of the year. Beginning in January, 2025, the Blue Door will be open for full service on Wednesdays only. The weekly food distribution will continue on Tuesdays as usual. Pastoral care also will be available on Tuesdays. The Blue Door no longer will be open on Mondays and Fridays. The decision to reduce our schedule was made reluctantly, but for a number of good and substantial reasons. We have been blessed with a dedicated, capable, and faithful all-volunteer staff. But our staff and especially its leadership has been stretched and stressed to the limit. The strain has been compounded by the increasingly hostile response to our unhoused and needy sisters and brothers in communities across the country, which has resulted in a clientele that is more transient and troublesome to deal with on a day-to-day basis. Second, health concerns have required Ron Marro and previously Kathy McGee, who have led the Blue Door so faithfully and capably, to step down from active leadership and day-to-day involvement in the Blue Door. Third, a reduction in services will provide an opportunity for all volunteers to take a breather. Moreover, it allows time for our clergy, vestry, and Blue Door leadership and volunteers to reassess and reimagine the Blue Door going forward. In the meantime, the Blue Door is open. Ericca Cavenderstepped in as interim Caldwell has coordinator. Volunteers who have worked on Mondays and Fridays will continue to have opportunities to work on Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

Wisdom 3:1-9

They believed that the godly will join God and the angels in heaven, where God will protect them from the "foolish", that is, those who go against God's ways. A Reading from the book of Wisdom.

The souls of the righteous are in the hand of God,

and no torment will ever touch them. In the eyes of the foolish they seemed to have died, and their departure was thought to be a disaster, and their going from us to be their destruction; but they are at peace. For though in the sight of others they were punished, their hope is full of immortality. Having been disciplined a little, they will receive great good, because God tested them and found them worthy of himself; like gold in the furnace he tried them, and like a sacrificial burnt offering he accepted them. In the time of their visitation they will shine forth, and will run like sparks through the stubble. They will govern nations and rule over peoples, and the Lord will reign over them for ever. Those who trust in him will understand truth, and the faithful will abide with him in love, because grace and mercy are upon his holy ones, and he watches over his elect. The Word of the Lord.

Standing or kneeling as we are able

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.

In the Nicene Creed we state our belief in the "communion of saints." But who are saints, and why are they in communion?

We typically think of saints as some elite corps of super righteous souls who we know just have to be in heaven. Many of those saints in their own special way have been "'lights of the world in every generation,' people whose lives and deeds have shone brightly and helped others more closely follow God."¹

And, indeed, we recognize the more notable among them on our church calendar. The Church also has published two volumes of saintly commemorations, Holy Women, Holy Men and A Great Cloud of Witnesses. And every Wednesday at our noon service, we honor the life of a saint from the Church calendar for the week.

But that is a much too limited definition according to the Episcopal Dictionary of the Church, which defines a saint as "a holy person, a faithful Christian, one who shares life in Christ."² So the term "saints" includes both the living and the dead. It includes, as it were, saints and sinners. It includes us. And it means we are in communion with -in a deep and intimate and spiritual and actual relationship with - all our sisters and brothers in Christ, whether know it, whether we acknowledge it, whether live into it.

This communion, this connection, this commonality is realized all the way down to our DNA. Dr. Francis Collins, the former director of the National Institutes of Health and former director of the human genome project is a faithful Christian, a saint. He notes in his book, The Language of God, "[A]t the DNA level, we [humans] are 99.9 per cent identical."³ Ninety-nine point nine per cent. How could we not be in communion with each other? We all are made in the image of the same, one God. We all are called to be imitators of the same Jesus Christ.

That's why the reality of the communion of saints is something we acknowledge in our creed and in just a few minutes in our Baptismal covenant. And in our celebration of All Saints Day, we begin with A Litany of All the Saints and a commemoration of those dear saintly souls in our own lives that have preceded and enlightened us.⁴

We are tasked by the divine to bring about the kingdom of God on earth as it is in heaven. The reality of the communion of saints is no less seminal to our understanding of God, God's vision, and our undertaking of God's work in the world than our profound hope for the resurrection of the dead and life everlasting. In fact, the communion of saints is the human means to God's ends. And, again, that is us, whether we are a bishop, a priest, a deacon, a warden, or a seemingly anonymous member of a church in Destin striving not just to survive but to thrive.
